Home Learning Project for Autumn 1: Design and create a 17th Century House

Dear Parents and Carers,

Each half term the children will complete a home learning project that encompasses many aspects of our varied curriculum through the chosen topic for that half term. This half term the topic is 'Fire, Fire!' and through this the children will explore the history of the Great Fire of London and 17th century England. The home learning project will support the learning that happens during school time and allow it to continue at home.

The project for this half term is to design a model 17th century house. The children must decide what each section of their house will be made from, and then use a range of materials to make a model house.

The following must be included in the project:

- Research what 17th century houses looked like
- Design and draw an annotated plan for a model house
- Create a 3D model (from any materials they choose)
- Write a diary entry in the style of Samuel Pepys, showing your reaction to the fire

These are the basics that must be included in the project, however, it is not limited to this and I would actively encourage the children to be creative in adding to the brief, for example, they may choose to create some bread in the style of the 17th century. Attached is a brief example project to give you an idea of the sort of content your child may choose to include in their project. Throughout the half term the children will be learning about different things that will support them in completing their project. Please encourage them to use their learning in the classroom to inform their home learning project.

The finished project will need to be handed in to me by the 12th October. I am looking forward to seeing some amazing houses!

We would also like to invite you in on the Monday, 15th October at 3:00.pm to join in the celebrations of the children's projects and to give them a chance to share their hard work and efforts.

Research what 17th century houses looked like:

17th century houses are called are referred to as Tudor houses, because of period of time in which they were built. Some Tudor houses still exist, which gives us an insight as to what they were like. Most were built of wood and clay, and were squashed very close together.

The streets of London in 1666 were very narrow, and very busy. The upper floors of these buildings often leant over the bottom. Some of the buildings leant over so far you could lean out of the window and shake hands with the person from the house across the road!


