The start of Green Ridge's second year has seen the school more than double in size and finally move into the new (and much improved) permanent building.

It has been a successful first term for Green Ridge, with new pupils and staff settling in well. Whilst there have been some teething issues with the building, we are now benefitting from the new facilities and more comfortable learning environments that the permanent building has brought.

Green Ridge has continued to go from strength to strength during the first term of this academic year; this has been as a direct a result of the hard work of the entire staff. In particular, the board were delighted to hear that Miss Imbriano won the Outstanding New Teacher of the Year award in October, and we would like to extend our congratulations to Miss Imbriano.

As well as a new building, new pupils and new staff members, Green Ridge is also welcoming a new Chair of Governors. I am stepping down from the role to be replaced by Rachel Leach, previously the Vice Chair and one of Green Ridge's original governors. Work commitments and a recent relocation have meant that I am unable to give the role and the school the time that they deserve, and so I have decided to step down.

Safeguarding at Green Ridge Academy

As the link governor for Safeguarding at Green Ridge Academy, I always have the children's safety at the forefront of my mind during every visit to the school.

During my last meeting with Mr. Wanford we looked at the new building, reception, e-safety and I even had chance to speak to some of the pupils about how safe they feel within the school. Firstly, praise goes out to Mrs Rosser and Mrs Erdos who greet you when you enter Reception. It may seem like Fort Knox trying to get into the school, signing in using the new system and having a photograph taken, but this is paramount to making sure that all pupils are kept safe within the school.

When I spoke to the pupils about how safe they feel, they were very vocal in letting me know that they feel safe at school. They could tell me what the different coloured lanyards represent that visitors have to wear and who they can approach. They know where in the school they are allowed to enter and where they are not. Pupils also told me that they

feel safe walking to and from school, which was lovely to hear.

What is great about Green Ridge Academy is that they spend time teaching the pupils and parents about a variety of safeguarding issues that may arise in today's climate, such as e-safety and bullying. Earlier this term, parents and carers were invited to an e-safety and bullying workshop. The workshop was designed to inform parents and carers about the warning signs of bullying they should look for within their child and how to support them. Even if parents and carers could not attend the workshop, all pupils were sent home with a 'Say NO to bullying' handbook which includes case studies from parents of children who have been bullied, top tips on how to prevent bullying, why schools don't just get rid of bullies, warning signs to look out for if you think your child is being bullied or what to do if your child is bullying others. Six weeks in the life of a Parent Governor

Week 1 This evening I'm doing a two-hour course in Safeguarding. This is my first training course as a parent governor, and I'm unsure what to expect – perhaps it will be a bit dry? It isn't. Despite the facilitator assuring us she wouldn't get into the details of unpleasant safeguarding cases, it's detailed enough for me to come away feeling sick about what can happen if safeguarding procedures aren't followed. I have enough knowledge now to understand how to support the school with Safeguarding, and a renewed appreciation of why it's so vital.

Week 2 A governor meeting this evening. This means a couple of hours of reading documents and formulating any questions I want to ask. At the meeting itself, in addition to agreeing updates to some policies, we look at the school's data on pupil progress across the year groups, and talk about strategies to further raise attainment.

Week 3 I complete my first governor visit; all governors spend some time in the school regularly. My areas of responsibility are Reception, Community (including the PTA) and English curriculum, so I meet with relevant members of staff to understand how the strategies we discuss in governor meetings are working in practice. Afterwards, I get to see a selection of children's school work, to see the progress they are making. I am most impressed at how happy the children are, and how engaged they seem in their lessons.

Week 5 A full-day course on a Saturday today, for an Introduction to Governance. As a new parent governor, I'm keen to increase my knowledge of my role. It's also really useful to get to meet other new governors. It's also a brilliant excuse to leave the children with my husband for the day and drink coffee and eat biscuits.

Week 6 Our next governor meeting. One of the focuses for this meeting is on budget, and planned spending by the school. With a whole new school to furnish and buy resources for, there is a lot to talk about.

It's certainly quite time-consuming being a governor, and a steep learning-curve – but I'm finding it fascinating and a real opportunity to help make my children's school as good a place as it can possibly be.
