

Primary PE and Sport Premium 2018/2019

Department for Education Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium:

ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport

What is the PE and Sport Premium Funding?

The government is providing additional funding of £150 million per annum for academic years 2013 to 2014, 2014 to 2015 and 2015 to 2016 in order to improve physical provision of Physical Education (PE) and sport in primary schools.

This funding, provided jointly by the Department for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, is allocated to primary school Headteachers. We have the freedom to choose how the money is spent, but it is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision of PE and sport at Green Ridge.

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following OBJECTIVE:

To achieve <u>self-sustaining improvement</u> in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the vision (above) that will live on well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

It is expected that schools will see an improvement against the following 5 key indicators:

- 1. the engagement of <u>all</u> pupils in regular physical activity kick-starting healthy active lifestyles
- 2. the profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
- 3. increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- 5. increased participation in competitive sport
