A note from the Headteacher

I genuinely cannot believe that today is, in theory, our last day of this half-term; time has simply flown away over the last few weeks after Easter (or this may just be me!). Over this week I have been particularly thinking just how different this year has panned out, and how we could not have imaged this at this point last year as we held our Global Diversity week and open afternoon event.

Yesterday afternoon I had the opportunity to meet with a range of parents/carers from across the school for the Parent Forum Meeting. Thank you for those of you who passed on questions or thoughts for us to think about, and no doubt your class reps will feedback and the minutes of the meeting (published later on in the newsletter) will give some answers to your questions. As my letter to you yesterday morning stated, we are still not able to agree to open Green Ridge as we do not yet believe we have the necessary precautions and resources in place to do so. We are not uncommon in this, and in fact all our academies in REAch2 are in the same position, along with many other schools up and down the country. We're currently sourcing PPE, sorting logistics around the school, changing classrooms around and all manner of things to ensure that all staff and pupils are safe when we do re-open. I thank you for your patience throughout all of this. I hope that later next week or immediately after half-term I can update you with our further developments and plans.

As a reminder, we are <u>CLOSED</u> completely on Monday, 1st June, and reopen for childcare provision from Tuesday, 2nd June as normal. In the meantime, I wish you all an enjoyable and safe half-term break; let's hope the weather stays kind and you can enjoy some outdoor time!





Year Four Urvi wrote a fantastic story this week.


The Invisible Man
