Ambulance Service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Used in a health emergency if someone is ill or injured. Call 999 and ask for an ambulance.
Fire service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Used if something is on fire or someone is trapped in or on something. Call 999 and ask for an ambulance. Firemen wear special clothes to protect them from heat and smoke.
Police service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Used if someone has broken the law. Police Officers might arrest a criminal and put them in jail.
Health service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Doctor- you make an appointment if you are ill. Dentist- you see to check your teeth or visit if you have a tooth/ mouth problem. Optician- checks your eyes and will give you glasses if you need them. Hospital- you might see a nurse or a doctor if you have a specialist appointment or are ill. Physiotherapist- you would see if you have an old injury or need to do exercises to help mobility.
Armed Forces	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Army- protect our country RAF- protect our country from the air Navy – protect our country from the sea Royal Marines- part of the Navy.
Tradesmen	<p>Possible trades to be discussed could include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Builders Plumbers Electricians
Education Service	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Nursery teachers Teachers College University

Additional Vocabulary Glossary

Ambulance	A vehicle that might take you to hospital in an emergency.
Fire Engine	A vehicle that has specialist equipment to help put out fires
Police Car	Police officers drive them to apprehend criminals
Siren	The light on top of an emergency vehicle that flashes and makes noise to let people know they are coming.
Emergency	A problem that needs to be dealt with immediately.
Prescription	A doctor or nurse may give you a prescription to get some medicine.
Criminal	Someone who has broken the law.
Law	Rules set by the government that we must follow.
Trusted	Someone who is reliable.
Apprehend	To arrest someone for a crime.

Prior learning

- Start of topic—Assess what facts the children know before starting the topic.
- Planning—Based on moving the learning on from individual starting points.

 - Water safety
- Cleaning our teeth

Bare in mind any parental specialism and link this to the children's learning with parents coming in to share job's and roles.
