

# What have we been learning this week?

#### Little Ridges Nursery



This week in Little Berries we have been focusing on the season Winter. The children have been learning about how we dress in winter and what the weather is like. The Berries have really enjoyed the Plant and Sharing this month and we have given them out to a few houses in the local area. We have learnt the Makaton for snow and the words of the

week have been huge and worried. The Berries have

been marking in snow (flour), dressing the snowmen and making hats. We have been caterpillars watching our grow and they are starting to cocoon which is so exciting! Next week our focus is mini beasts. Have lovely weekend and look we forward to having a fun last week of this half term next week!





Little Acorns have had another busy week; this week, we have learnt all about snails and slugs. The children have remembered lots of facts about these bugs and it has been fantastic to see lots of children spotting snails and slugs at home or on the way to school! To link our learning to these bugs, the children have created swirl pictures,

manipulated playdough to make snails and slugs and use shells for their shells and they have even made chalk swirls.

We have continued to watch our caterpillars grow; the children have observed the caterpillars get longer and they look forward to seeing them form a chrysalis. We are really proud to say that Little Acorns have finished learning our Talk4Writing story, 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'!

#### Reception

This week we have been looking at all of the plants we have in the grounds around school, thinking about how they got there and whether the seeds were planted on purpose or arrived by another method. We challenged the children to have a look at the types of plants they see on their journey to school or when out at the weekend to see how they think they got there.

In maths we have been looking at subtraction and creating number sentences to show how we have worked things out. Our plants have started to grow brilliantly so we decided to brave planting them outside!

#### Year One

This week the children have explored poetry in English. They looked into a number of poems, some with rhyming words and some without. The children started off by performing some poetry. This involved them coming up with actions and learning the words. They performed their actions to the rest of the class. In Maths, we have been working on fractions this week and exploring halves and wholes. We have done this practically using shapes and we folded them to find halves. In Science, we concluded that plants need sun, water and soil to grow and we began to look at identifying wild plants around the school site. In Computing, we worked on building up our typing skills and played some fun typing games - Mr Arnold was so impressed with our typing skills.

#### Year Two



Year Two have had another brilliant and busy week. In English, we have been learning all about sense poems. We began by exploring and reading a range of poems to identify the features and help us to create our poetry toolkit.

To help us to

generate ideas for our own sense poem, we went on a senses walk around the school to explore the sounds, smells and sights around us. We then used these ideas to write a poem about a different sense each day.



#### Year Three

This week, Year 3 have enjoyed beginning their unit on poetry where we are looking at shape poems. We have analysed different poem and looked for features within them. We also picked out our



favourite phrases within them so we can build a bank of vocabulary to use in our own poems. We have also begun reading and performing poems to further

develop our fluency of reading and expression in our voices.



#### Year Four

The children in Year 4 had an opportunity to explore the software programme 'Audacity' this week in Computing and enjoyed exploring how to take samples of self-recorded sounds to change the sequence of a piece of music. The class also planned their own science experiment based on conductors and insulators and investigated what happens when they added as a component in a circuit.

#### Year Five

This week, year 5 have been looking at comparing and ordering acute, obtuse and right angles, as well as using a protractor to measure angles in degrees. The children have been using their model text and their shared writes to write their own wishing tale. In Science, the children have been debating the pros and cons of zoos, and in History, we have been looking at the role that women had during World War II. In RE, we were looking at how the non-religious charity Oxfam supports people around the world.

## News items from this week

#### Volunteers

We are forward thinking and are already on the lookout for volunteers from September! We previously had a small (but mighty!) army of parent/carer volunteers who helped us in numerous ways with the many, many jobs and tasks we do in school. Some of the jobs include listening to children read and changing reading books.

Unfortunately due to the pandemic, we were no longer able to allow visitors or volunteers on site. As things appear to be moving in the right direction and restrictions are slowly being lifted, providing that support is regular and we follow our risk assessments, we hope that we can welcome volunteers again from September.

Once you have completed and returned your application form, a member of staff will be in contact to arrange a suitable time for the safeguarding training, volunteer induction and to advise you of what is required for your DBS.

#### Wellbeing Tips

Scientific studies have shown that securely attached children go on to live happier lives, have better relationships, do better academically and have higher emotional intelligence and resilience.

How can we ensure that our children have secure attachments?

If we connect with our children *during their most difficult emotions*, we are securing this attachment. What are we teaching them by responding appropriately to their emotions?

- their emotions are valid
- they are worthy of our time
- they are loved unconditionally
- their feelings matter
- emotions are a normal part of life
- experiencing emotions is nothing to be ashamed of
- relationships are about support, trust and care This will help them:

- manage their emotions effectively
- to not seek external sources to fulfil internal problems (addiction in later years)
- have trust in authority, friends and relationships
- have high self-esteem and self-worth
- potentially prevent long term mental health issues such as anxiety and depression
