I was able to meet remotely with Green Ridge Director of Inclusion (who is also the school's SENCo) Vicki Gardiner, Assistant Head Nikki Mackie and Reception teacher Harley Chalmers to discuss SEND and Reception development plans respectively.

Reception staff have updated classroom learning environments to provide high quality stimuli for the children and additional monies have been allocated to ensure that the learning environments are updated regularly. Chalmers is the Music lead at Green Ridge Academy, and she has been working with Bucks Music Service to arrange a peripatetic guitar teacher to provide lessons for some of the children, which has been a welcome opportunity with excellent uptake.

Vicki Gardiner and I attended a remote SEND governance training in late May, organised by Professor Adam Boddison who is the Chief Executive of the National Association for Special Needs (NASEN). This was a useful course as it signposted key resources for SENCos and SEND governors as well as some important updates in SEND legislation and guidance and also provided a pool of expertise that governors and SENCos could tap into. Some of the key information shared was national data and research from the Education Endowment Foundation and British Ability Scales. I have since become a member of NASEN and I am receiving regular communications regarding key SEND information and hope to use this to guide and support my governance role in this area.
