

#### Routines in Year Five

- Doors open at 8.45am, which is when learning commences.

Colouring pencils	Basic coloured set				
Ruler	<ul> <li>30cm ruler that folds away into 15cm length</li> </ul>				
Rubber	No more than two rubbers				
Sharpener	<ul> <li>'Canister' type sharpener which collects pencil shavings in a pot</li> </ul>				
Green and Blue biro	<ul> <li>Any standard green and blue type biro (e.g. Bic or Staedtler) for children's self-editing and corrections</li> </ul>

#### Presentation

- There is a focus on presentation across the school, particularly on layout and expectations of what the children produce.
- We are working hard to ensure that the quality of work done in school is reflected in the children's home learning as well, so please support us with this.



#### PE/Games

- Children need their full PE kits in school for the wholeweek. Children should be prepared to go outside whatever the weather for Games, so please ensure they have a tracksuit/jumper etc. to put on over their normal PE shorts and T-shirt. Trainers are definitely required for this lesson!
- Children cannot wear normal PE kits outside in the winter.



## English

- English is taught following the Pie Corbett approach.
- All topics are based on a key text.
  - This is presented in the form of a text map or boxing up grid. The children imitate the text by recalling it with actions. The children will then innovate through adapting it orally before writing their own version. It is important that the children can say their sentences before they write them.
- Reading books/records will be checked weekly. Each child should have at least one reading book.
- There is a big focus on spelling (5/6 common exception words). These are in children's reading records, so can be practised at home too.
- Library books will be changed once a fortnight (Thursday). If children are reading these at home, please record this in their reading records too.



### English

- We expect all pupils to read daily for up to 10 minutes outside of school. We would expect parents/carers to record daily reading in the child's reading record, which should be brought to school each day.
- There will be daily reading skills sessions where the children will refine their reading skills.
- During the Autumn Term staff will listen to the children read individually once a week.
- During the Spring and Summer Term staff will aim to listen to children individually once every three weeks.
- Staff will initial and a brief comment in their reading record books.



## English

#### How you can support at home

- Read daily with your children and ask them questions about their books
- Continue to support the use of SPAG.com
- Practise spellings and apply them in sentences
- Encourage writing in different styles for example by keeping a diary or writing postcards
