Teaching Arrangements

Which uniform should my child wear in September?

Either Winter or Summer uniform is acceptable until October half term. Winter uniform is worn from October half-term until Easter and summer uniform is worn from Easter until half-term in the autumn term.

- Remember to name everything!





Routines in Year Six

- Doors open at 8.45am, which is when learning commences. Early Morning Work is vital for embedding key skills each morning. Where possible, please ensure that your child does not miss this opportunity. Doors close at 8.55am when the register is taken.
- We expect that you leave the children at gate in the mornings and let them walk in by themselves. Expect us to encourage independence.
- If your child arrives at school after this time, please ensure that they sign in at the school office. They will not be allowed to enter via the external classroom door.
- Things for the office (e.g. payments) can be brought into school on any day but must be in a named envelope and immediately handed to the class teacher or adult or taken to the secure post box outside the main office.
- If your child is absent, please ring the office as soon as possible to let us know. Otherwise you will be contacted.
- Explanatory notes should be brought in by your child and passed to the class teacher/adult who will ensure this is taken to the school office.
- If your child is ill in school and is not able to remain in class, a member of staff will be in contact. Please ensure emergency numbers and contact details are up to date.
- Children in Year 5 and 6 can have permission to walk to and from school independently. If this is something that you would like to happen, please ensure that you have contacted the office to give permission. Please ensure children are aware of behavioural expectations when walking to/from school.
- Children who walk to and from school independently may bring their phones into school. These are kept in a secure location in the classroom. Phones must remain turned off for the whole time they are at school.





What to bring

Pencil Cases

In Year Six, children require a named pencil case containing:

| Green and Blue biro | Any standard green and blue type biro (e.g. Bic or Staedtler) for children's self-editing and corrections |



Presentation

- There is a focus on presentation across the school, particularly on layout and expectations of what the children produce.
- We are working hard to ensure that the quality of work done in school is reflected in the children's home learning as well, so please support us with this.
- Children will need to write in handwriting pen during Key Stage Two, and we will insist on the highest standards so children take pride in their own work and learning.
- A key writing objective for Year 6 is for children to join legibly and at speed.

Behaviour Expectations

- We expect the highest standards of behaviour from the children at all times, irrespective of who they are with.
- We focus on the positives within the classroom, rather than the negatives, e.g. "Walk, thank you."
- We follow the whole-school policy.
- We teach children the correct behaviour for learning, e.g. being responsible, resilient, resourceful, reflective and how to reason.
- These learning behaviours / muscles are displayed in our classroom.
- The children are given dots (stickers) when they display the learning muscles that are essential to lifelong learning.
- Please ask your children why they have received the dot to encourage a positive dialogue around learning.

PE/Games

- Children need their full PE kits in school for the wholeweek. Children should be prepared to go outside whatever the weather for Games, so please ensure they have a tracksuit/jumper etc. to put on over their normal PE shorts and T-shirt. Trainers are definitely required for this lesson!
- Our topic in PE this term is football shinpads would be a useful addition until the October Half Term.
- Children cannot wear normal PE kits outside in the winter.



English

- English is taught following the Pie Corbett approach.
- All topics are based on a key text.
 - This is presented in the form of a boxing up grid. The children imitate the text by recalling it. The children will then innovate through adapting it orally before writing their own version. It is important that the children can say their sentences before they write them.
- Expect spelling words to be sent home on a Friday.
- Reading books will be changed whenever children have finished a book. The children are able to change these independently now.
- Library books will be changed once a fortnight.



English

Reading

- We expect all pupils to read daily for up to 10 minutes outside of school, to an adult for younger children, or independently as the children develop into fluent readers. We would expect parents/carers to record daily reading in the child's reading record, which should be brought to school each day.
- There will be daily reading skills sessions where the children will refine their reading skills.
- During the Autumn Term, staff will listen to the children read individually once a fortnight.
- Staff will initial and a brief comment in their reading record books.



English

How you can support at home

- Read daily with your children and ask them questions about their books
- Practise spellings when they begin to bring them home and apply them in sentences
- Encourage joined handwriting wherever children are writing at home
- Encourage writing in different styles for example by keeping a diary or writing postcards
- Complete activities such as ReadTheory and SPAG.com



Maths

- Autumn term: Place Value, Four Operations, Fractions, Geometry
- Spring term: Decimals, Percentages, Algebra, Converting Units, Perimeter, Area, Volume, Ratio
- Summer term: Statistics, Properties of Shapes

How you can support at home

- Practise fluency of basic number facts (particularly in times tables up to 9 x 9)
- Encourage children to develop mental arithmetic skills
- Encourage children to handle money and tell the time/solve contextual time problems

- Spelling practice linked to the class spelling rule
- Times Tables Rockstars
