




The royal residence at Windsor. Built in the 11th Century Has 300 fireplaces and 450 clocks The great kitchen is the oldest working kitchen



Was originally built as wooden motte and bailey castle then as

Surrounded by a dry moat on the northern side.

The gatehouse has two drawbridges, a gate and portcullis,



The keep- the tower

The curtain wall-built around the outside of the keep and bailey The bailey- enclosed area between the inside of the wall and keep. The gatehouse- faced the bridge over the moat.

The draw bridge- a bridge over the moat.

The moat- deep, wide ditch surrounding the whole castle

Ramparts- steep banks of earth or rubble.

Curtain walls- surrounded castles like a strong shield Arrow loops- safer way to fire arrows on to attackers.

### Banquet



An elaborate and formal evening meal often followed by speeches. A medieval banquet menu would have meat and fish (Venison, wild boar etc) and unusual birds (swan and peacocks). There would be savoury and sweet tarts and pasties and fruit and cheese.

#### Knights



Knights were heavily armoured soldiers who rode on horseback. Their armour was made of metal

knights came from noble families rich enough to pay for training. A knight was devoted to the church, loyal to his lord and would only speak the truth.

A Knights weapons were a lance, sword, mace and longbow. knights were trusted to defend the castle and were expected to fight with bravery and courage whenever required.


#### Royal Family



The British royal family have belonged to the house of Windsor since 1917.
