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Grammar point—Personal pronouns

Remember that the nouns have genders and that they can be identified by their article: *der*—masculine, *die*—feminine, *das*—neuter. (This is why we always learn the article with the noun when we learn new vocabulary.)

The article for the plural form is *die* (*die Kinder*).

The teacher now explains that nouns can be replaced by personal pronouns: *der*-*er*, *die*-*sie*, *das*-*es*, *die* (*pl*)-*sie*.

Der Vater heißt Roland. Er heißt Roland.

Die Mutter heißt Renate. Sie heißt Renate. D

as Kind heißt Klaus. Es heißt Klaus.

Die Kinder heißen Peter und Claudia. Sie heißen Peter und Claudia.

Remember that all words have a gender and that many words that are neuter in English are in fact masculine or feminine in German. Therefore a chocolate is a 'she' in German while an apple is a 'he'.

Die Schokolade ist lecker. Sie ist lecker. Der Apfel ist gelb. Er ist gelb.
