# “I’m just me.”



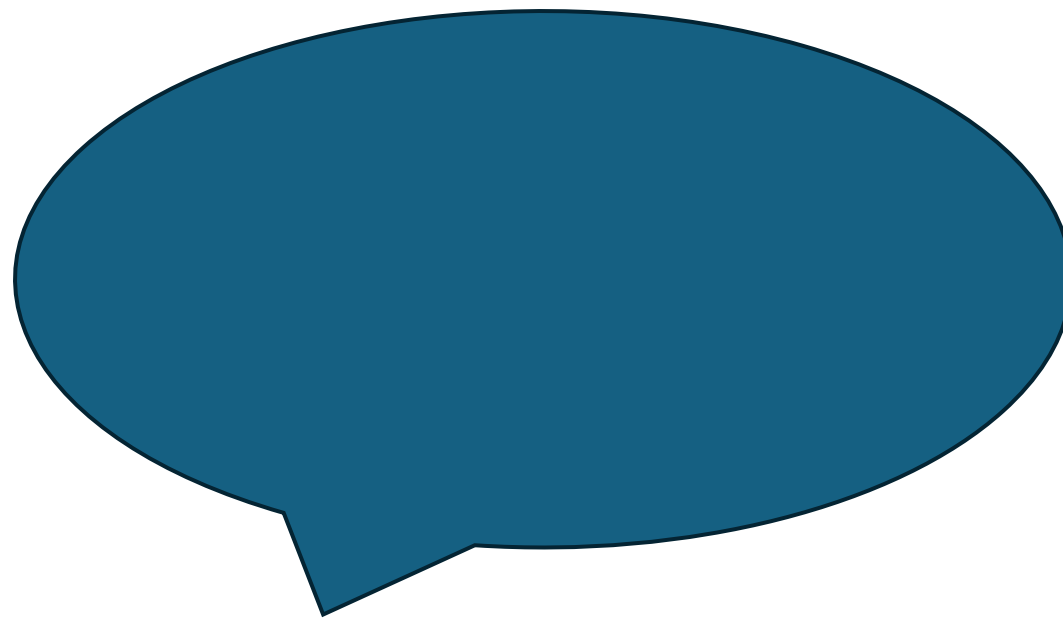
The Rainbow Scouts were a children who loved exploring. Each scout wore a badge representing something special about them – kindness, curiosity, bravery.
