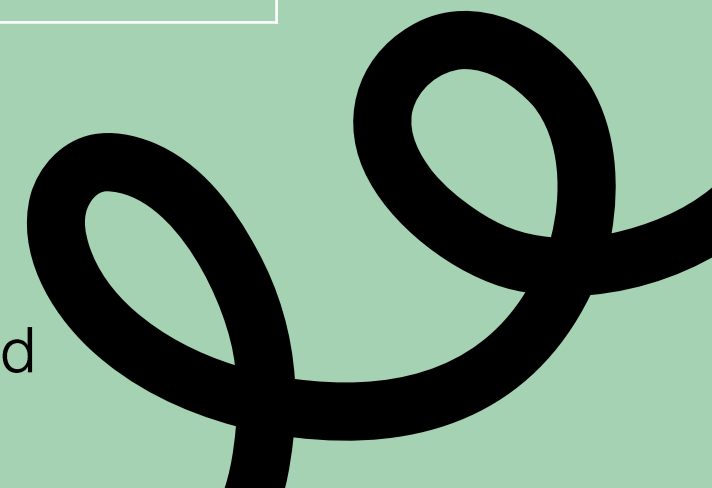

Start of the Day Routines in Year 1



- Classroom doors open at 8.35am. School starts promptly at 8.45am.
- Children complete morning fluency as part of the maths curriculum between 8.35-8.45am. Where possible, please ensure that your child does not miss this opportunity.
- Doors will close at 8.45am and this is when the register begins. We are asked that once doors close, they are not re-opened for any late pupils. Late pupils must go via the office to sign-in and give a reason for lateness.
- We ask that you leave children at the door in the mornings and allow children to walk into the classroom by themselves.
- Parents/carers can pass on any quick messages to staff at the door in the mornings. However, if parents/carers need to speak with your child's teacher about something that is urgent and in private, then please do make an appointment through the main office by telephone or e-mail.



End of the Day Routines in Year 1



- The school day finishes at 3.15pm. Pupils will only be allowed to leave with an adult who is on the school's permission list. Please be patient with us in the first few weeks should we need to check before allowing a pupil to leave, as many new adults in year-groups may not know all faces around the school!
- Parents/Carers must wait on the playground away from the windows.
- When the member of staff who is dismissing has seen a child's adult waiting on the playground then they will be called and allowed to leave.
- Children will be collected from their classroom door.

Things to Bring



- Clearly labelled water bottle
- Book-bags or small drawstring bags only– reading wallet kept inside every day.
- Appropriate clothing for weather clearly labelled.
- They can bring in welly boots if they would like.
- If your child has a sports club, they may be required to bring their PE to change into. Please ensure this is labelled.

Please do not let your child bring in any squashies, toys or personal belongings unless we have specifically requested!



PE/Games



- PE in Year 1 is on a Tuesday and a Thursday . Children should come to school on these days wearing their full PE kit.
- Children should be prepared to go outside whatever the weather, so please ensure they are dressed appropriately.
- Children cannot wear normal PE kits on their own outside in the winter (due to the weather).
- A reminder to all parents and carers to please refer to our Uniform Policy for guidance on PE kit expectations. On PE days, children should come to school dressed a house-coloured branded T-shirt, black shorts or jogging bottoms, and trainers. Children should not be coming to school in non-uniform or casual clothing on PE days.

Behaviour Policy



- We use the THRIVE approach as core part of our pupils' well-being, behaviour, and development.
- We have adopted the Norfolk Steps therapeutic approach to behaviour. The emphasis on consistency of approach and response, the teaching of internal rather than external discipline.

Pupils will no longer be given a level instead we will follow the following steps...

1. Verbal reminder (a discrete warning that their behaviour is unacceptable)
2. Turnaround time (redirecting the focus. 1:1 chat with teacher or TA to explain direct consequences of their choice).
3. Some children may require Take-up time
4. Time to change (if behaviour persists, children stay in with the teacher and discuss their behaviour and/or complete their task. This time should be used with restorative approaches: Respond, Reflect, Repair, Restore.
5. Children will have a fresh start once a restorative conversation has happened

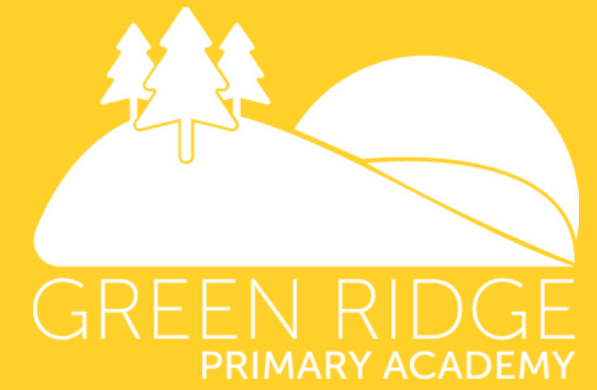


Rewards and positive reinforcement

- Verbal praise
- Sharing pupils' work with other staff or pupils to celebrate

Reading Expectations in Year 1



- Children in Year 1 will be given a book to read at home. This book will be sent home every Friday after they have practised reading a similar book in school. Books should be returned to school on Thursday. A new book will only be sent home once the previous one has been returned, so please make sure books are brought back promptly.
- Children will read daily in school and will be heard read regularly by adults in the classroom. Each child will read with an adult at least once a week.
- We expect children to read at home every day to help develop their fluency, confidence and enjoyment of reading. Parents and carers do not need to record or log home reading. Simply listening to your child read and discussing what they have read will provide valuable support.
- In addition, your child will also bring home a sharing book, which they will have chosen themselves from the library. This is a book that your child may not be able to read on their own but that you can both read and enjoy together. The main idea of the Sharing Book is to have fun reading and promote a love of books!
- The children will visit the library every Wednesday, however this is subject to change.

Home Learning Expectations



English

- Read daily with your children and ask them questions about their books
- Promote strength in hand grip through activities such as manipulating playdough or cutting which will support pencil grip
- Encourage writing in different styles for example by keeping a diary or writing postcards

Maths

- Practise number bonds to 10 through songs and games
- Practise counting in 2's, 5's and 10's
- Count objects in different environments and talk about the language of adding / more or taking away / less
- Go on regular shape hunts and encourage the children to describe what they notice about them
